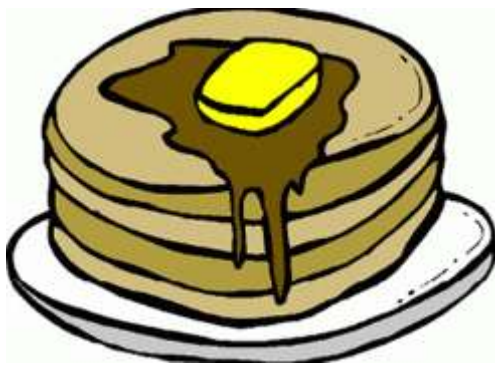

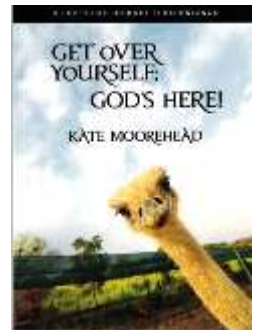
Wednesday Lenten Academy Program



The 2012 Lenten Academy begins on Wednesday, Feb. 29, at 6 p.m. in the parlor. The theme for our five-week program is based on the book "Get Over Yourself; God's Here!: A 40-Day Journey of Repentance." Recommended to us by Elizabeth Fuemmeler, the author is the Very Rev. Kate Moorehead, dean of St. John's Cathedral, Jacksonville, Fla. Some of the topics are: Face the Bad Stuff First, Listen to God's Voice, Build Healthy Relationships, Communicate with Others, and Form Godly Habits.

Reflections on the Annual Meeting and Its Aftermath

First things first: hearty thanks and a round of applause to all you bakers, shoppers, setter-uppers and cleaner-uppers who contributed to the awesome brunch we enjoyed before (and after) the Annual Meeting was called to order.

During the meeting itself we heard some hard facts about our finances. We heard about possibilities, for ministry and for congregational growth. We heard questions and comments from various folks, all of whom held this in common: their love and concern for St. Peter's.



Looking back on it, it seems to me that the annual meeting got us under way with food for the body, and sent us off with **food for thought. If we want St. Peter's to grow and thrive, how much are we willing to give?** Giving financially is important, of course, but are we also willing to give a hand in support of new and existing ministries? Are we willing to give the time it will take to participate meaningfully in *Ripe for the Harvest*? Are we willing to give and take, to change if that is necessary for the sake of growing and thriving as a congregation?

Each of us will need to do some soul-searching in the year ahead as we wrestle with those and other questions about the

future of St. Peter's. Basically, we want to know where we are headed and how we are to get there. Or we might put it this way: what is our God calling us to? Prayer is an integral part of figuring that out. We have to do our footwork, of course, **but we do so ever mindful that we are in God's hands, seeking to do God's will.**

In the coming weeks we will all be asked to do some footwork. We will be asked to complete index cards for *Ripe for the Harvest*, for example, and to explore and support new ministries. As we do those things we need to be intentional about asking for the blessing and guidance of the One in whom we live and move and have our being, the One whose will we hope to serve. Through prayer and footwork we will learn more about who we are and how we can best serve our neighbors. Or we might put it this way: we will discern what our God is calling us to. And, as Paul reminds us, we will be empowered:

Glory to God whose power, working in us, can do infinitely more than we can ask or imagine: Glory to him from generation to generation in the Church, and in Christ Jesus forever and ever (BCP 102; Eph. 3:20-21).

Items on Narthex Table Testimony to Giving

Have you wondered about those jars and baskets on the table in the narthex? They are for ongoing Outreach projects. All the projects are easy ways you can help others in need. Outreach Committee members are: Ted Bell, Debbie Dribben, Anita Eulitt, Sandy Glenn, Jim and Jeanne McDowell, and Kemp Wiese. Please contact an outreach member if you have any questions or if you would like to become involved.

BackSnack

The food and backpacks come from Harvesters. All that is needed is to put the food in the packs. Every Thursday at 6:15 p.m., the backpacks are packed, then delivered by Ted Bell the next day. If you would like to help pack, help Ted with delivery, and/or donate bags of miniature candies, pencils, etc.; which are nice as extras for the backpacks or give money for the purchase of these items, please contact Ted.

Best Choice Labels

Please cut out your bar codes from any Best Choice items you buy (there are many more than just on can goods). There **is a jar in the Narthex for them. St. Paul's food pantry in Kansas City, Kan. turns them in for cash (3 cents for every label) and the cash is then used to support their food pantry. This is really an easy way to help make a difference. As the jar is filled, Sandy Glenn takes them to St. Paul's.**

Eye Glasses

There is a basket in the Narthex for the glasses. They are collected a couple of times a year and have been given to Haiti and to the Lions Club.

KCRM

Kansas City Rescue Mission (KCRM) is always in need of those individual-sized soaps and shampoos. As you travel, please remember to bring back any spare shampoo/soap. There is a basket in the Narthex to drop them into, marked KCRM. Debbie Dribben takes the items to KCRM.

Another KCRM project is the knitting/crocheting of hats and/or scarves. They are knitted throughout the year and are collected in early December for delivery to KCRM. Please contact Anita Eulitt if you are interested in participating in this project. Every hat and scarf is greatly appreciated.

Backpacks are always needed. If you see any at garage sales in good shape, grab them. New are great, too. Just leave them under the table in the narthex.

Hearing Aids

The Midwest Ear Institute can recycle old hearing aids. They will refurbish your old hearing aid/aids for those who **can't afford one but must wear a hearing aid for at least 6 months** before they can qualify as a candidate for a cochlear implant. If you have replaced a hearing aide and no longer need it, please contact a member of the committee or Jim McDowell or bring it to the church office.

Labels for Education

St. Peter's Day School collects these. Most of us know them as the Campbell's labels, but now there are other companies participating: products from BIC, Post cereals, Prego, Swanson, V-8, Glad storage, magazines (Time, Cooking Light, People, Southern Living, Health, Real Simple), Spaghetti's, Pop Secret, and Wolfgang Puck. Collect bar code labels or bottle caps. Just look for the "LABELS FOR EDUCATION" point on the bar code. A large basket under the table collects these.

These are simple, almost effortless ways to assist in St. Peter's Outreach programs. **The little time it takes to cut out a label, bring in an old pair of glasses, or bring in the leftover health and beauty products from a hotel stay may make an immeasurable difference to someone in need.**

February Outreach

During the month of February we will be directing our Outreach efforts to St. Peter's United Church of Christ's food pantry. They can always use canned vegetables, canned fruit, toilet paper, paper towels and detergents. They also can use disposable diapers for the older toddlers in size 4 and 5. They are always grateful for the items they receive. During the month they fill their shelves and when the finish handing out items to their clients their shelves are very nearly bare, so all help is appreciated.

If working with Outreach is something you think you might like, extra help is always welcome. There are many opportunities and areas in Outreach that one could pick from to be involved with. If this sounds interesting just let me know and we can talk about it. As always if you want to help with the **pantry items but cannot get out to shop or don't have time, just write a check and indicate "Outreach" in the memo portion of the check.**
