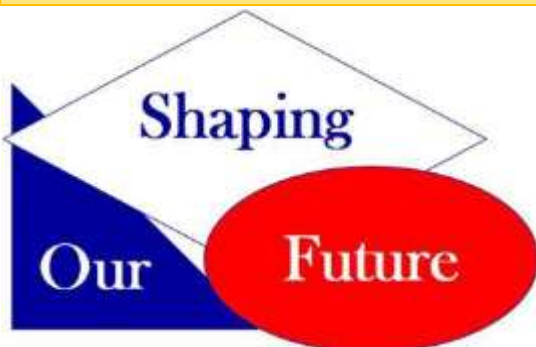
The Feast of St. Francis of Assisi Blessing of the Animals, Oct. 8

If Jesus Asks You, How Would You Answer?



We began Adult Ed on Sept. 18 with the story of Zacchaeus (Luke 19:1-10). Quick recap: Zacchaeus is short in stature, and he also falls short of respectability in the eyes of his Jewish neighbors because he is a tax collector and collaborator with Roman authorities. He positions himself in a tree so as to be able to see Jesus passing by in a crowd. Jesus surprises everyone, including Zacchaeus, when he invites himself over to Zacchaeus's house; Zacchaeus surprises everyone, except possibly Jesus, when he takes Jesus up on the offer and promises to make good on the money he has stolen from his neighbors (tax collectors in those days routinely charged more than was actually owed, and pocketed the difference).

We read this familiar story aloud and imagined ourselves to be one of the characters. Most of us placed ourselves in

Zacchaeus's sandals; one of us was a grumbler in the crowd. Then we imagined Jesus inviting himself over to our houses, and how we might respond. All of us learned a little bit about ourselves and our Lord from this short (sorry, Zacchaeus) exercise in reading a Gospel story from the inside out.

If you were unable to attend our opening session, and if you wonder how it might be to encounter Jesus as Zacchaeus did, try this: settle yourself in a quiet place; invite the Holy Spirit to inspire your mind and heart as you read the passage through slowly; observe what happens between Jesus and Zacchaeus; and then imagine Jesus turning to *you, right now, and saying "You, too! I must stay at your house today!"* What do you say to Jesus? How do you feel? Take some time to think about this, maybe write down your thoughts if that helps, and go where the Spirit leads you in your encounter with the One who knows you best and continually calls you into deeper relationship.

Rector's Ruminations

Dear Friends:

As I have been working on my sermon about the Israelites being hungry in the wilderness and how God fed them with manna, our help as a parish community to our brothers and sisters in Joplin has to be one of the more important acts of **humanity that St. Peter's could offer in 2011. I'm glad to see that there is already a rack in Kathy Hall's office that is starting to gather coats for the collection that ends Oct. 9.**

The *No-Charge Garage Sale at St. Philip's Church, Joplin*, on October 22, is certainly an example of generosity that is offered by parish communities throughout the Diocese of West Missouri. This is a great time to check through your closets **and drawers, check out what's downstairs in storage and in the workshop area to see what has not been worn or used for a few years. Ask yourself, "Have I worn this coat or sweater, or used this tool, for some time? Maybe someone else could use them, or the blanket, quilt, hammer, screwdriver, or pliers which I also haven't used for years."**

And then, of course, are those personal items that haven't been used, but they're hard to give away because they have a special meaning: a sweater received by someone no longer living, but it doesn't fit any more. Should I keep it or give it away?

I know that when I cleaned out my mother's apartment and then the lake cottage, there were some choices that had to be made: keep it, give it away, or simply trash it? Some items were contributed to our garage sale last June. Others went to the thrift shop in Hutchinson, and much went "bye-bye" when cleaning out the lake cottage.

One thing that I realized was how much energy this all took; making decisions on items that were once valuable to someone or yourself, but now no longer important. Could somebody else use it? Is it worth giving away, or simply put it in the dumpster? I found this to be exhausting after a while and a break was necessary so that I could continue the task at hand.

I hope that you will take a deep breath and say to yourself: **I've got items that I'm willing to make sure that they are clean, wearable, usable, in working order, so that those who lost everything, may find my contribution helpful over the winter months.**

As Archdeacon McCann suggested, "*This is not a traditional 'garage sale,' i.e., a means to dispose of items nearing the end of their serviceable life – This is an offering to those in need from the 'first fruits' of our life and labor.*"

Come on St. Peter's, let's do it! ☺

October is St. Monica's Nut Sale month! We will, again, be offering a variety of fresh and good-for-you nuts, with proceeds from the sale supporting the special projects that St. Monica's undertakes in our parish community and through outreach efforts. Payment (cash or check) is required with your order. Look for the table in the narthex on Sundays. Orders will be taken through Oct. 31 with delivery before Thanksgiving.



Do you have a new recipe that includes nuts? Please send it to me, and I will make copies available on the nut table in the narthex. Oh, those irresistible nuts...Here is an idea for fun and nutty pasta...

Bow Ties with Walnuts, Butter and Sage
 Makes: 6 servings
 Prep: 10 minutes

Ingredients

- 1 cup coarsely chopped walnuts
- 3/4 pound bow tie pasta
- 5 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 12 fresh sage leaves, coarsely chopped
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/3 teaspoon black pepper
- 1 cup shredded Romano cheese

Directions

1. Place walnuts in a large, dry nonstick skillet over medium heat. Cook 4 to 5 minutes, until toasted, shaking pan constantly. Remove walnuts; set aside.
2. Cook pasta in boiling salted water according to package directions, about 10 minutes. When pasta is almost done, melt butter in large nonstick skillet over medium heat. Add sage, lemon juice, salt and pepper. Cook a minute or two to blend flavors. Remove from heat.
3. Drain pasta, reserving 1/2 cup pasta cooking water, then add pasta to butter in skillet. Gradually add pasta water. Stir in cheese and toss to combine. Garnish with toasted nuts and serve.
